About this course

This is a variable-credit course that awards credit for students doing internships. Most internships are for two- or four- credits.

The course requires that every student file a job description at the beginning of the semester. (See example that follows. A .pdf of this form is attached.)

Every Monday, send an email that briefly describes what you did in the last week. You may include links to your work or offer attachments of your work. However, this is not required.

There is no special form for these reports. They're just somewhat informal email updates.

A short (2-3 page) paper reflecting on the internship is due on the last day of the semester. These can be informal, like personal essays. These should be sent as attachments.

At the end of the semester, you will be evaluated by your supervisor. (See attachment that follows.)

Send all material – job description, weekly reports and reflection essay to wmckeen@bu.edu.

We'll take care of sending the evaluation to supervisors.

When you send in reports, include your last name as the first wording the subject line of your emails. Thus, if your name is Mortimer Snerd –

- SNERD Job Description
- SNERD Weekly Report 1
- SNERD Essay

Please let us know if there are any workplace issues we should know about. If you find yourself to be harassed or in a hostile work environment, please let me know.

This is a pass-fail course. You must enroll in the course. Securing an internship does not mean you automatically get credit.


